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### **City Liaison Report – David MacRae**

#### **Item #1: Emerson House - 1646 Dundas St. W.**

It's now been over 12 years since the first development application was made to the city. Submissions as directed by OLT/LPAT have almost all been accepted by the city except for a few push backs which will be resubmitted shortly. During this process the developer has switched from 91 high end units to 140 units to comply with affordable housing requirements. But guess what...The developer's final plan which came last month is to become a rental/lease project...no sales. City planner Jonathan Famme will advise me of any further changes but I believe this project has finally come to conclusion with the city.

#### **Item #2: 2935/2955 Mississauga Rd. File# OZ/OPA 22-6 W8**

I've been in touch with the city planner Lucas Petricca on a regular basis and the city is waiting for finalized comments from CVC and The Forestry Section. The planner is waiting to have confirmed the exact limits of all the natural features and hazards lands so he has a better understanding on what type



of land can be developed. The city is most concerned with the Woodland feature, but my concern is the closeness to the top of the bank of the Credit River.

### **Item #3: Erindale Village Community Hall – Turning 100**

I have been in touch with Bradley Stoll who's involved with the Heritage department, and it looks like the city will go through with major renovations [projected budget \$ 1.5 million] to honour the 100<sup>th</sup> birthday of the hall coming up in 2028.

As part of this project I've asked for the city to include a small parkette at the back of the parking lot with benches and a garden where resident can gather for friendly get togethers. I believe our final approval will come shortly once the city budget is approved.

### **Item #4: Village Parking**

After the major parking violations in the village during the EID celebrations last year in the park, we filed a complaint with the city and a survey was sent to the residents for parking restrictions and as a result of the survey, no parking signs have been erected in the village.

For future events coming up like [Great Outdoor Comedy Festival] there will be no parking in the park and all attendees will be bussed to the park. Also we've asked for no parking signs for the community hall lot except for renters based on during our fall festival last year, the lot was full of cars from the park and we had to have the event indoors rather than outside.

### **Item #5: Village Speeding**

A number of residents have complained about car speeding in the village putting in danger children, pets and adults.

The city has agreed to do a 24 hour survey monitoring the speed of cars to confirm that there should be speed bumps installed. In addition we asked the city for a 3 way stop at the corner of Adamson and Proudfoot, to reduce the long stretch along Adamson where cars can accelerate at high speeds.
